

by Susan McBride

2) Kingdom Keepers III: Disney in Shadows

by Ridley Pearson

The third installment in Pearson's bestselling four-part young-adult thriller is set in Disney World. Pearson, who makes his home in the St. Louis area, is a big booster of local libraries.

3) Where's My Wand?

by Eric Poole

The first-time author, who now resides in L.A., chronicles a child-hood gone awry while growing up in a suburban St. Louis tract house during the 1970s. Kirkus Reviews called this Sedaris-style memoir "a witty, observant, deliciously satisfying autobiography."

4) Olivia's Story:

The Conspiracy of Heroes Behind Shelley v. Kraemer

by Jeffrey S. Copeland

Based on a true story, Olivia's Story tells about the brave group—including Olivia Merriweather Perkins, an African-American teacher in the St. Louis schools—who championed a landmark Supreme Court decision.

5) A Taste of Honey

by Jabari Asim

St. Louis native and former editor of the Washington Post Book World Jabari Asim centers these short stories around growing up in St. Louis during the '60s.

6) Private Life

by Jane Smiley

This riveting novel from the Pulitzer Prize winner and native St. Louisan traverses the land-scape of one woman's life, from the 1880s to World War II.
